Browne, guitarists Robert Browne and Wayne Armond,

and entertaining.

And the Kingston, Jamaica-born musician is very much in touch with his Caribbean roots in the trio's rendition of Bob Marley's "Is This Love?" from Alexander's

"Stir It Up: The Music of Bob Marley."

The pianist also collaborated with reggae's dynamic duo—drummer Sly Dunbar and bassist Robbie Shakespeare—on the "Monty Meets Sly and Robbie" album on Telarc. Alexander is an extraordinary talent; his shows are special. He's a must-see when he comes to town.
